

Den Chief Training - 8:00am to 12:00pm

Scouts BSA/Crew members learn how to serve as a scouting role model for Cub Scouts in a den and pack; promotes scouting and the troop or crew; encourages the transition of Webelos/AOL scouts into Scouts BSA troops; fulfills advancement requirements for a leadership position in the troop or crew; assists the den leader with planning and conducting den meetings. Great overview for Den Leaders and Scoutmasters/Assistant Scoutmasters to better understand the Den Chief program.

Leave No Trace 101 - Awareness Course - 8:00am to 12:00pm

Learn from our own LNT Master Educator, Maria Brown. Leave No Trace integrates Scouting's ethical and decision-making focus into the outdoors environment, providing Scouting members with a principled framework to assist in arriving at making ethical decisions in the outdoors. Leave No Trace practices apply to all outdoor activities, including those at Scout camps, camporees, and on all types of public or private lands. Meets Requirement #5 of Outdoor Ethics Award. (Cost \$5 given to the instructor for supplies. Scouts BSA/Venture Crew age 14+)

Fundamentals of Training - 8:00am to 12:00pm

An introductory course for new and experienced scouting trainers to learn BSA teaching techniques and skills. Participants learn in a team-based setting similar to scouting's patrol method. Experienced trainers coach and mentor the participants as they become comfortable with and more confident in their training skills. **Required** for NYLT and Wood Badge staff.

Recharter Timeline & Membership Fees



Unit Recharter - 2024

The BSA issues charters to community organizations to enable them to use the Scouting program under their own leadership as a service to their children, youth, and families. Rechartering is the process of renewing the charter agreement between the BSA and the organization, and renewing the registration of youth and adult members. Every unit must recharter annually.

Youth Protection Training (YPT) is required annually of all adult leaders. To reregister for 2024, every adult 18 years of age and over must have taken YPT during the year of 2023. Anyone without the 2023 renewal will be dropped until compliant and then they are eligible to reregister (a new adult application will be required).

Recharter Unit Timeline - TIME FOR STAGE 2

<u>Stage 1</u> - Recharter Prep - Oct. 1 to Oct. 31 (Assign Recharter Champion, complete Membership Inventory, review Journey to Excellence status & start collecting renewal fees)

<u>Stage 2</u> - Internet Recharter - Nov. 1 to Dec. 1 (Unit collects final renewal fees, updates roster, submits recharter online, submits payment to Council along with Journey to Excellence scorecard & Annual Charter Agreement signed by Chartered Organization)

Stage 3 - Council Process - Dec. 1 to Dec. 31 (Validates recharter & resolves defects)

• Youth - \$95 (National \$80 plus Council \$15)

- Adult \$75 (National \$60 plus Council \$15)
- Exploring Adults & Youth \$65 each
- Scout's Life -- \$15 per year
- Unit Recharter Fee \$100 per unit

Here's a good "to-do" list for you to review:

- 1. There is a supply of popcorn at the Scout Office. If you would like to pick-up some of this inventory, contact Randy or Cindy to get updates and arrange pick-up.
- 2. Orders for the FINAL product delivery, including Chocolate Pretzels, are due online by Friday, November 10.
- 3. Any Heroes donations you have received will also need to be entered into your final order online. This will allow your inventory to balance which will be needed in order to complete the sale and order Trails End Rewards prizes. The Council will be responsible for delivering popcorn to a number of "Heroes" groups in our area. If your unit is interested in participating in a delivery, let me know. Product will be available for pick-up on November 30
- 4. Any product that you have ordered previously that you want to return is due by November 10. You can return up to 10% of your total order. You will also lose the 2% commission bonus earned by returning popcorn.
- 5. Invoices are due to be paid in full by December 8 th. Your unit earns 3% bonus commission by paying in full by December 8.
- 6. Prize orders for Trails End and Council incentives are due by December 15.
- 7. The Condors tickets incentive for any Scout that sells \$1,000 (2 tickets) is due by December 1. The Scout Night at the Condors Game is December 9. What is National Youth Leadership Training? NYLT is the entry-level program for youth ages 13-17 to learn and practice leadership skills with their peers in an outdoor environment. Leadership skills are essential for all youth to navigate everyday challenges and be more successful with school and college/university, band/sports, church, community service, work, family life, and, of course, Troop and Crew youth leadership. Scouts participating in the

NYLT course are better prepared for life.

Qualifications:

- Youth ages 13-17 years old (Troop or Venture Crew)
- · Earned 1st Class rank or higher
- Recommended by the Scoutmaster for NYLT

Scholarships: Youth may request scholarships for registration fees through their Troop or Venture Crew, the Council office, or the NYLT course itself.

Course Leadership: The NYLT course is run by youth and adult volunteers with Southern Sierra Council and possibly some volunteers from Verdugo Hills Council and Long Beach Area Council. Youth volunteers have completed the NYLT course and are ready to take on new leadership challenges.

Safety in Scouting

Incident Reporting Helps

Timely and complete incident reporting provides the BSA with an opportunity for analysis of incidents that occur and promotes continuous improvement of our programs. In our experience, the sooner a clear, concise, and complete incident report is made, the sooner that an appropriate response to the incident can occur.



GENERAL INFORMATION

What is an incident? There are three types of reportable incidents:

- Near Miss—A near miss does not result in injury, illness, or damage, by definition, but it had the
 potential to do so.
- General Liability—Events or allegations of injury, illness, or property damage, including employment, director, and officer issues.
- Youth Protection/Membership Infraction—Allegations of abuse, violations of BSA guidelines or policies, or inappropriate behavior by a Scout/Scout leader/parent/other.

Why report an incident? The information reported from incidents helps identify areas for improvement so we can help prevent the reoccurrence of similar incidents. The BSA cannot address a concern if we do not know about it. Reporting incidents promptly is also critical so the BSA can respond in a timely manner and manage claims properly.

When do I report an incident? You should immediately contact your local council to report and get assistance with serious, fatal or abuse incidents. Report within 24 hours if an injury or illness cannot be treated by Scout-rendered first aid, a medical professional such as a doctor or nurse was needed, or an ambulance was called.

How do I report an incident? There are incident reporting tools to assist you in collecting the facts of the incident to provide to the council. This is available on the council website www.sscbsa.org. Scroll down on the home page to "Incident Reporting Tools".

Reporting tips: It is important that incident reports are filled out as completely & timely as possible. This will help bring clarity to the situation and avoid unnecessary calls or emails for additional information. Photographs of the site, facilities, vehicles, or equipment can add value to the report. Remember to include only pertinent facts about the incident. Do not assign blame or include personal opinions. Stick to the facts.
