Recharter Unit Timeline - TIME FOR STAGE 3

<u>Stage 1</u> - Recharter Prep - Oct. 1 to Oct. 31 (Assign Recharter Champion, complete Membership Inventory, review Journey to Excellence status & start collecting renewal fees)

<u>Stage 2</u> - Internet Recharter - Nov. 1 to Dec. 1 (Unit collects final renewal fees, updates roster, submits recharter online, submits payment to Council along with Journey to Excellence scorecard & Annual Charter Agreement signed by Chartered Organization)

<u>Stage 3</u> - Council Process - Dec. 1 to Dec. 31 (Validates recharter & resolves defects)

- Youth \$95 (National \$80 plus Council \$15)
- Adult \$75 (National \$60 plus Council \$15)
- Exploring Adults & Youth \$65 each
- Scout's Llfe -- \$15 per year

2024 Scouts BSA Advancement Changes Effective January 1, 2024

As of January 1, 2024, the following changes to Scouts BSA requirements become effective.

Rank Requirements:

There are minor change to Scout (6), and Star (^).

The Cyberchip has been phased out. Scouts should use the Personal Safety Awareness training at https://www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/scouts-bsa/ for both Scout and Star ranks.

Eagle Palms:

Scouts BSA will no longer have to wait three months between Eagle Palms. They will have to earn fiver additional merit badges, and live by the Scout Oath and Law.

2024 Cub Scout Advancement Changes Effective June 1, 2024

The four areas of improvement are the **Bobcat badge**, **Cub Scout Adventures**, **Webelos**, **and Cub Scout Awards**. Bobcat will no longer be a badge that is earned once when a Cub Scout joins. It will become a required Adventure for each rank and earned each year.

What is National Youth Leadership Training?NYLT is the entry-level program for youth ages 13-17 to learn and practice leadership skills with their peers in an outdoor environment. Leadership skills are essential for all youth to navigate everyday challenges and be more successful with school and college/university, band/sports, church, community service, work, family life, and, of course, Troop and Crew youth leadership. Scouts participating in the NYLT course are better prepared for life.

Qualifications:

- · Youth ages 13-17 years old (Troop or Venture Crew)
- · Earned 1st Class rank or higher
- · Recommended by the Scoutmaster for NYLT

Scholarships: Youth may request scholarships for registration fees through their Troop or Venture Crew, the Council office, or the NYLT course itself.

Course Leadership: The NYLT course is run by youth and adult volunteers with Southern Sierra Council and possibly some volunteers from Verdugo Hills Council and Long Beach Area Council. Youth volunteers have completed the NYLT course and are ready to take on new leadership challenges.

Safety in Scouting

Incident Reporting Helps

Timely and complete incident reporting provides the BSA with an opportunity for analysis of incidents that occur and promotes continuous improvement of our programs. In our experience, the sooner a clear, concise, and complete incident report is made, the sooner that an appropriate response to the incident can occur.



GENERAL INFORMATION

What is an incident? There are three types of reportable incidents:

• Near Miss—A near miss does not result in injury, illness, or damage, by definition, but it had the potential to do so.

- General Liability—Events or allegations of injury, illness, or property damage, including employment, director, and officer issues.
- Youth Protection/Membership Infraction—Allegations of abuse, violations of BSA guidelines or policies, or inappropriate behavior by a Scout/Scout leader/parent/other.

Why report an incident? The information reported from incidents helps identify areas for improvement so we can help prevent the reoccurrence of similar incidents. The BSA cannot address a concern if we do not know about it. Reporting incidents promptly is also critical so the BSA can respond in a timely manner and manage claims properly.

When do I report an incident? You should immediately contact your local council to report and get assistance with serious, fatal or abuse incidents. Report within 24 hours if an injury or illness cannot be treated by Scout-rendered first aid, a medical professional such as a doctor or nurse was needed, or an ambulance was called.

How do I report an incident? There are incident reporting tools to assist you in collecting the facts of the incident to provide to the council. This is available on the council website <u>www.sscbsa.org</u>. Scroll down on the home page to "Incident Reporting Tools".

<u>Reporting tips</u>: It is important that incident reports are filled out as completely & timely as possible. This will help bring clarity to the situation and avoid unnecessary calls or emails for additional information. Photographs of the site, facilities, vehicles, or equipment can add value to the report. Remember to include only pertinent facts about the incident. Do not assign blame or include personal opinions. Stick to the facts.
